CICC Mission Statement


The CICC is charged with advising and providing recommendations to the U.S. Attorney General on issues relating to advancing the use of technology, standards, and collaboration among agencies or organizations in the area of criminal intelligence. The CICC serves as an advocate for local law enforcement agencies in their efforts to develop and share criminal intelligence for the promotion of public safety and the security of our nation.

Recent CICC Products

The Analyst Professional Development Road Map identifies suggested minimum competencies, knowledge/skills/abilities, and education/training for the basic, intermediate, and advanced analytic levels.



The Privacy, Civil Rights, and Civil Liberties Audit Guidance for the State, Local, Tribal, and Territorial Intelligence Component is designed to help state, local, tribal, and territorial agencies conduct a privacy, civil rights, and civil liberties audit of records within the agency's intelligence component.



In addition to these resources, the CICC, in partnership with BJA, has developed the weekly Five in 5, a snapshot of law enforcement and criminal intelligence-related articles, resources, and research that may be of interest to CICC members and partners working to improve the nation's ability to develop and share criminal intelligence. Continuing CICC Priorities

- ◆ Continue to enhance criminal intelligence development and sharing capabilities for state, local, and tribal law enforcement and homeland security agencies.
- ◆ Empower all law enforcement agencies to participate in information and criminal intelligence sharing efforts and initiatives, including support to the designation of fusion liaison officers (FLOs) within agencies and development of training on the officers' role in criminal intelligence development efforts.
- ◆ Articulate the nationwide criminal intelligence architecture, examine how the different criminal intelligence-related initiatives and efforts complement each other, and identify how law enforcement and homeland security agencies fit into this architecture.
- ◆ Support and enhance event deconfliction in agency operations.
- ◆ Provide support to law enforcement and homeland security agencies in understanding and prioritizing threats within their respective areas of responsibility and how to address these threats, including the importance of suspicious activity reporting.
- ◆ Develop a technology framework designed to assist law enforcement agencies in the procurement and use of technology, as a part of criminal intelligence and investigative activities.
- ◆ Create a checklist for use by law enforcement agency executives as they assess agency operations, focusing on potential privacy, civil rights, and civil liberties (P/CRCL) issues.
